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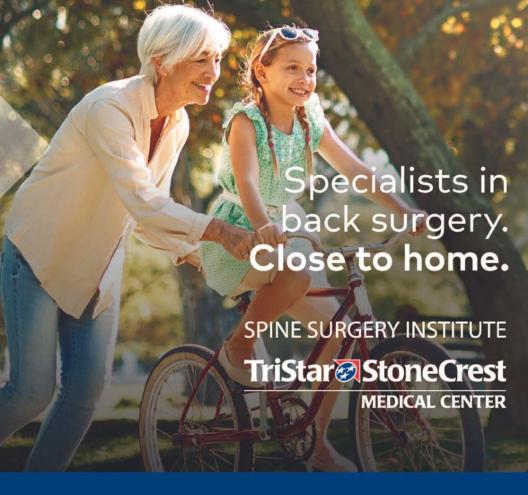


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If you're planning a large event such as a business meeting, wedding, or any other get-together, catering options are available.

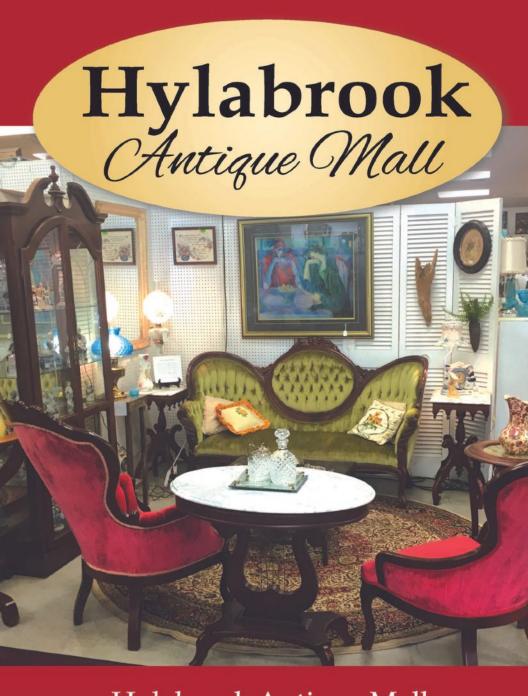

You'll see in the first scene a giant picture frame featuring Algernon's father, a general whose absence can be felt throughout the show, especially upon second viewing.

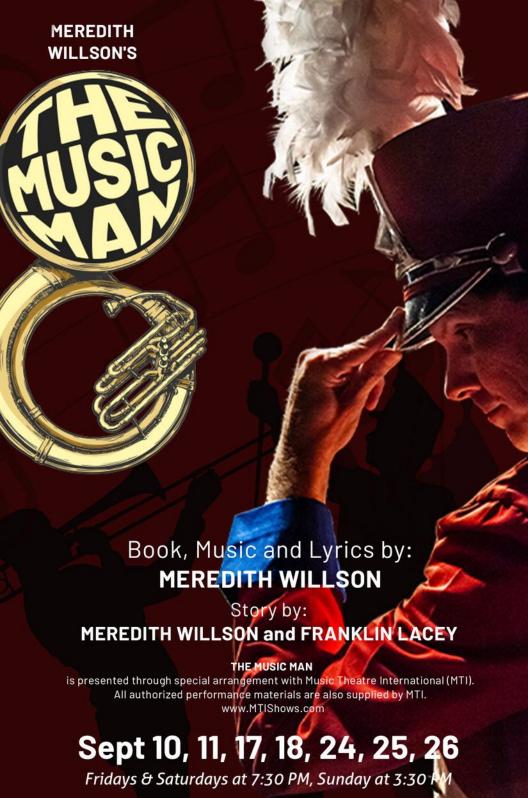
There are two reasons that I chose to set this show in the Reconstruction Era South, instead of 1890s England:

One, and most importantly, thematically. I wanted to show that the ostentatious absurdity of the British upper crust was not so far off from the upper crust of other societies. I also wanted to point out the similarities not only between British and Southern American upper castes, but simply the two accents. British and Southern American are remarkably similar in their musicality.

Two, I knew Southern accents are more understandable to local audiences and easier for local actors. I hated the idea of alienating audience members just because of an unfamiliar way of speaking, or bringing in talented actors and crippling them with untenable accents.

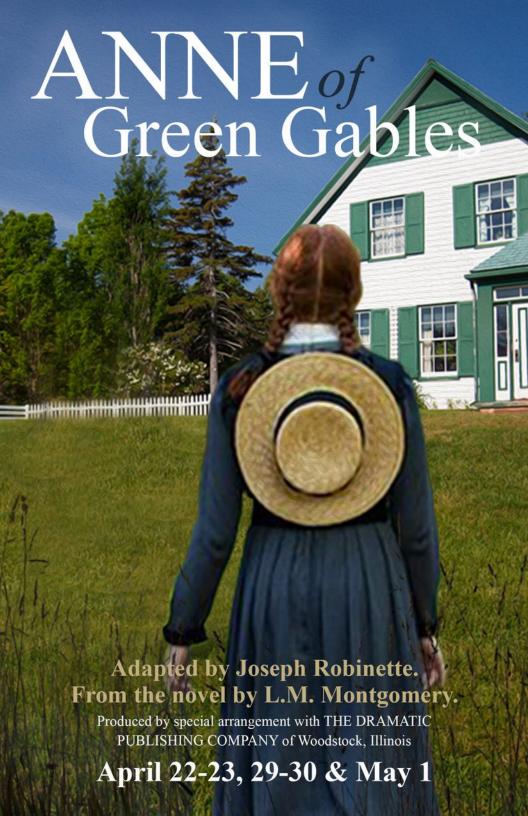

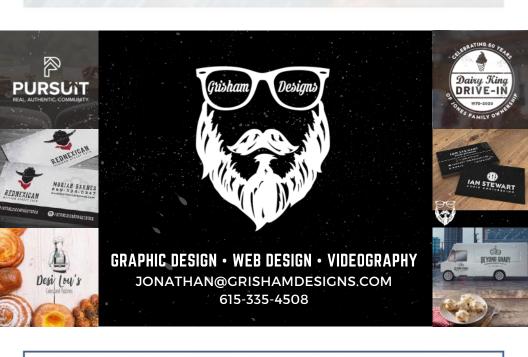
